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If you've ever walked the streets of St. Michaels and wondered what it would be like to peak into some of the unique and historic homes that dot the town, now is your chance. This year's Christmas in St. Michaels Tour of Homes December 9-10, 2017 features a mix of waterfront estates and waterman's cottages in and around town. In a weekend packed with parties, parades and special events, the Tour of Homes is the highlight, drawing visitors from far and wide for a close up look at the past and the present.

Eight homes in all are featured on this year's tour - six in St. Michaels and two in nearby Bozman. This year's tour features several renovated old homes with modern interiors, new homes built to look old and one house that played a role in the battle that gave St. Michael's its nickname - the Town that Fooled the British. Transportation is provided to all out of town locations. Tickets are \$25.00 for both days.

One of the most unique homes on the tour this year is the Cannonball House, built in the early 1800s when Thomas Jefferson was president and now listed on the National Registry of Historic Places. During a British assault on St. Michaels in 183, the town hung lanterns high in the tree tops mimicking lit windows. The ruse caused the British to overshoot most of the houses except one - the Cannonball House. The home earned its name when a cannonball tore through its house and rolled down the stairs, narrowly missing the homeowner's wife and new baby. Burn marks are still visible between the second and third floor. The battle also gave St. Michaels its nickname - The Town that Fooled the British.

Other homes include two waterfront estates; a replica of an 1870s home that incorporates a 200-year old waterman's cottage known locally as the Marshall House; the Aaron Dyott house with its asymmetrical three-bay elevation; a former boarding house that now boasts a small vineyard and a Little Free Library plus several other noteworthy and interesting homes.
